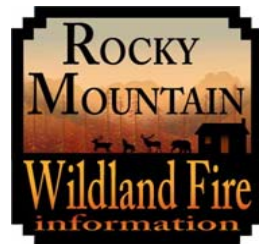


## WHAT YOU'LL FIND ON OUR WEBSITE

The wildland fire communications group came together early in the catastrophic wildfire season of 2002 to facilitate interagency collaboration in fire information, prevention and communication efforts during fire emergencies and to engage the public in prevention efforts. The need to provide support to wildland fire communicators about best methods for teaching and communicating with the public quickly became apparent. The initial website, then housed with the Bureau of Land Management, was redeveloped by the Colorado State Forest Service with the help of many partners and evolved into the current website.
